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

with these visual delights; however, it can be done if we remember to be creative and make learning engaging and fun. Playing Scrabble or Apples to Apples, during a family game night, for example has value. Not only do children get the message that you love them and enjoy spending time with them, they learn reading skills in the process.

We need to maintain balance in our lives and help our children learn balance in their own lives. Balance for some might mean reading more books and spending less time playing video or computer games. As parent's we need to evaluate how much time our children spend playing computer games, versus reading a book, or engaging in meaningful activities that require the use of their imaginations.

In our present day society, children from the youngest preschooler to the oldest high school student are more computer literate than many adults. You can usually get help for a computer problem from a young adult faster than a help desk or computer manual. Our education system has done a great job making our students' computer savvy and they will need these skills to get ahead in the future but let's not allow them to lose their love of reading.
